For her first exhibition in Scotland, and her most ambitious project to date in the UK, Hardy will create a major new installation in situ at The Common Guild.

In a practice that spans photography, sculptural installation and audio, Anne Hardy constructs environments that hover between depiction and abstraction. Using careful composition and precisely controlled perspectives, she stages our encounters with these spaces, which are at once functional and illusory.

Hardy is interested in what she describes as "the kind of space that is just there, next to you, and you don't see it". Her pool of references includes objects salvaged from the streets, a collection of images of accidental sculptures and architectural improvisations, as well as the fictional worlds of authors such as JG Ballard and Haruki Murakami.

Hardy describes her sculptural installations as attempts to make "physically existent head spaces" or "illusions that you can enter". They inhabit the gallery, volumes that reveal their making but not, at first, their contents. Details spill out, like sound and light, and the controlled interiors are populated with gatherings of found and made objects - remainders of interrupted actions that conjure an ambiguous parallel space at the cusp of everyday life.

This new exhibition reinforces The Common Guild's reputation to quality exhibition-making with artists. From shows with major established figures (such as Roni Horn and Wolfgang Tillmans) to more emergent figures (like Ulla von Brandenburg and Thea Djordjadze), our programme has developed a strong and vital internationalist dimension for contemporary art programming in Glasgow.

- 1.Anne Hardy (b. 1970, lives in London) has exhibited widely over the last decade. Recent solo exhibitions include Kunstverein Freiburg, Germany (2014) Secession, Vienna (2012) and Longside Gallery, Yorkshire Sculpture Park, and in 2011 she was artist in residence at Camden Arts Centre. Recent group exhibitions include 'Mirrorcity: London artists on fiction and reality', Hayward Gallery, London, (2012), 'An Orchestrated Vision: The Theater of Contemporary Photography', St Louis Art Museum, Saint Louis, USA (2012) and 'Martian Museum of Terrestrial Art', Barbican Art Gallery, London (2008).
- 2. The Common Guild is a visual arts organisation based in Glasgow. It was established in 2006 and presents a dynamic, international programme of contemporary visual art projects, exhibitions, and events. These include gallery-based exhibitions at our current premises as well as non-gallery, one-off projects, talks and collaborations, such as 'Scotland + Venice 2013', an exhibition of new work by Corin Sworn, Duncan Campbell and Hayley Tompkins, and a major new project with artist Phil Collins in Queen's Park for Festival 2014.
